Amputation Concerns to Discuss with Clients

Before Surgery: The New Normal Will they have another person to help? Explain activities pet should not do while they recover. Review possible recovery challenges and delays. Suggest ideas to keep pets calm and engaged during recovery? Share how to create a safe home enviroment for recovery. Discuss how far the pet should be walking prior to stitches being removed. If interested, client should know about prosthetic options before surgery. Describe how to increase physical activity and when. **On Discharge Day:** Stress the importance of weight management. Pain medications: What is prescribed, why, and what are **Rehabilitation Therapy** the possible side effects? All pets benefit from rehab therapy. Explain dosage, duration, and any Suggest a rehab therapy evaluation to necessary tapering. learn about keeping their Tripawd injury-free. Pain signals: Tripawds can pay for first rehab visit. How to know if the pet is not getting. Refer clients to tripawds.org/rehab. enough pain control. What do common pain signals look like? What to do if the pet refuses to eat or becomes constipated. How long to wait if the pet doesn't urinate? **Phantom Pain:** Explain phantom limb pain symptoms. Describe what can be done to treat them. Incision appearance
